



"I'm missing the celebrations and funfair at the parish. Reflecting on memories with my late father, Mr. Arthur Jacobs, brings warmth. He was the organist at St. Anne's Church from childhood until his passing on January 25, 1995. Under Fr. Valles' guidance, I took up the organ while still in school. On February 16, 1993, I suffered a severe stroke affecting my right side, losing memory, coordination, speech, and thought.

On St. Anne's Feast, July 26, 1993, Fr. Abreo invited my father to play for the 7:30 am Mass. My father insisted, "Sandra will play, not me." His encouragement and coaching helped me relearn the piano using both hands. Music became my solace, restoring confidence even as I struggled with speech. The support of friends and a speech therapist aided my miraculous recovery. I continued playing at St. Anne's until moving to Amboli in February 2002. I am grateful to the Lord, Our Blessed Mother, and St. Anne for the strength to play on that memorable feast day in 1993 and for the journey since.







Journey with Jesuits

I fondly recall venturing on a journey that began with Uncertainty and Curiosity. Back then, I guess I was too young, and I had no idea of what lay ahead of me, of the adventures that lie await, of what a life with Jesuits would create.

Fortunately, on this journey, there has never been just one kind of Jesuit that I have encountered and never seen or met an ideal or the typically so-called "Jesuit". Not that I've not heard of such Jesuits, of course, I have, however, in my spiritual readings, of the lives of saints and Jesuit stories.

This is the first kind of Jesuits that I encountered on my journey, through the readings. Ideal, Pious, elevated and spiritual Jesuits, such as St. Ignatius, Peter Faber, Jerome Nadal and Simon Rodregues. These men had the perfect charism and spirit of the Society of Jesus and were in my sight the Perfect Jesuits.

The second kind of Jesuits I encountered were the Fools - "the Fools for Christ" these were those Jesuits that were the followers of Ignatius and his Society. I am talking about those Hundreds of missionaries martyrs, Saints and Blesseds, that fearlessly journeyed to unknown strange lands,

making Christ known to the ends of the earth and sometimes even losing their lives, many of which underwent hardships and suffering, most never

returned home

Rationally, these acts of selfless service would seem foolish. Yet they were astonishing enough to draw me to dare to be a fool for Christ in the eyes of the world.

The last kind of Jesuits are those that I've seen and lived with, on this journey to be one. And to be honest, they don't seem to resemble anything like the Jesuits that I perceived. These Jesuits are imperfect, moody, impulsive and Human. Yes, Human, they have no aura of divinity, no supernatural grace, they have no extraordinary Visions or miraculous powers.

Yet it's these Jesuits who have helped me nuture and preserve my Vocation. From them I know what it means to be human, imperfect and yet striving for MAGIS, always looking for the Greater Glory of God. They taught me to pray and care, laugh and sympathize.

Though Ignatius and company are praying for me, I know these Jesuits are there with me, in my faults, my failures, my imperfections and my sins. From them I know what it means, when they say; A Jesuit is a sinner yet Called to be a Companion of Jesus".

What more can we say of **Ignatius Loyola**

Clare Booth Luce, the American feminist writer, used to say: "A great man is a single sentence" and for St. Ignatius of Loyola, this sentence would be: **Ignatius taught the modern Church to pray.**


The chief characteristic of modernity is the experience of subjectivity. The modern world views experiences from the perspective of the individual, as opposed to that of society, thus laying emphasis on one's own experiences. By letting the individual experience become the launching-pad of his relationship with God and emphasizing 'subjectivity in prayer', Ignatius changed the way in which we look at God.

He brought into his relationship with God, his own experiences of failure and depression and his desire of doing great things. As he learned to 'discern the spirits', he discovered that in the seeds of his own despair lay his future vocation, and that prayer, our encounter with God, is rooted in our encounter with life.

Some of Ignatius's insights were:

- To ask for what you desire (at the start of prayer) and so bring your feelings into focus;
- To end every period of prayer with a personal conversation ('colloquy') with God, or the saints;
- To **stimulate the imagination** when we pray the Gospels by looking, hearing, touching and feeling...what goes on in each scene ('application of the senses').
- To test the feelings... the beginning, the middle and the end. To 'discern the spirits' in our feelings. Why feelings? Because emotions are better indicators of who and what we are than thoughts. Ignatius called feelings "movements of the soul".


The Exercises prepare someone for this encounter with the Divine very methodically: through control of the memory and the affections, regular reflection on what has taken place, continuous petitions and intercessory prayers, 'staying with the feeling' to decipher its meaning, to ultimate openness to God's grace, grace acknowledged and welcomed.



In all this the praying subject rooted in his/her own personal experience, acts consciously to prepare himself/herself for God's initiative, confident that it will come.

When we recall how millions of Catholics around the world have learned these methods of prayer through the Jesuit fathers in their parishes or educational institutes, we realize how much Ignatius helped the Church become aware of God's presence in the here and now, in the all too human experiences of us all.

For that is how Ignatius and the Society of Jesus taught the modern Church to pray.




